Idioms in English – Young Adults 2



Archery

Point out+

Definition: direct attention toward something

Examples:

He **pointed out** the new building to the other students.

The tour guide **pointed out** the interesting landmarks.

Pronunciation:

Both "pointed" and "up" get stressed, which means you hold them a little longer and say them a little louder.

He **pointed it out.**

The "d" in "pointed" gets linked with the "i" in "it." The "t" in "it" gets linked with "ou" in "out." This is a common pattern in English. When one word ends with a consonant sound and the next word begins with a vowel in the same phrase, they are linked together so they sound like one word.

He *pointed-it-out.*

The focus word (the most important word in the phrase) is "out." This is the "jump up" word, the word with the highest pitch or intonation.

He **pointed it out.**

+ This is a phrasal verb. Phrasal verbs are included on the TOEFL® test as they are so frequent in English.
